In 2014, we will meet on the fourth Sunday of every month, with the exception of October and December. Here are the remaining dates: Jun. 29, Jul. 27, Aug. 24, Sep. 28, Oct. 12, Nov. 23, and Dec. 14.

Our next meeting is Sunday, June 29th. We will begin at 2:00 pm with a reader's forum, discussing why we like tough guys in our mysteries/thrillers and which noir protagonists Hollywood has gotten right - or wrong.

At 3:00 pm, our featured speakers will be Gary Phillips, past president of Mystery Writers of America, and **John Shannon**, who will be talking about their books, which are set in Los Angeles.

Weaned on the images of Kirby and Buscema (Thor, Captain America, the Avengers, etc.) in Marvel comics, and Hammett and Himes in prose, Gary Phillips also draws on his experiences ranging from community organizer, teaching incarcerated youth, to delivering dog cages in writing his tales of chicanery and malfeasance. His latest includes being co-editor and contributor to Black Pulp, a retro anthology, the graphic novel Big Water, and Booklist said of his prose novel, Warlord of Willow Ridge: "Phillips is a veteran crime novelist who creates a plausible post-apocalyptic scenario in which the safety of middle-class America can dissolve in a moment. Exciting, violent, and entertaining."

John Shannon writes the Jack Liffey Mysteries. Dick Adler of the *Chicago Tribune* called Jack Liffey "The most interesting new private detective to lift his fedora over the horizon since Walter Mosley's Easy Rawlins!" In John's new book, The Chinese Beverly Hills, a wildfire is out of control. Jack hunts for a missing Chinese-American girl in the midst of rising racial tensions and the hidden machinations of two oil baron brothers who try to brew up their own Tea Party.

It will be quite a change from our discussion of cozies at last month's meeting.

Our May meeting featured a lively Writers Forum. The topic was cozy mysteries. Cozies tend to be kinder, gentler mysteries. The murders may be gruesome, but the violence takes place off stage. They are solved by amateur sleuths (often accidental sleuths) and humor is often used to soften the drama of the deaths. Some publications require certain guidelines for the genre, e.g. a dead body by page x, foul language must be PG-13, no overt sex, etc. Cozies are often written as series; some can be read out of order, but others work best if you begin with the first book and move on from there.

Many cozies have a recurring theme, e.g. John J. Lamb's Teddy Bear mysteries, Rita Mae Brown's Sneaky Pie mysteries, and Mary Marks' quilting mysteries. Our forum then morphed into a discussion of other subgenres as well, including: legal, hard-boiled, historical and mash-ups, which incorporate multiple subgenres.

At 3:00, speaker Mary Marks took us through her writing journey, culminating in the publication of her first book, Forget me Knot. Mary followed the old adage: Write what you know. An experienced quilter who had made over one hundred quilts, Mary had a built-in audience for her books. To date, there are over 20 million quilters in the U.S.

Mary took writing classes through UCLA extension. Following her writing instructor's advice, she rewrote the entire manuscript, switching from third to first person and making the book more humorous. She entered the manuscript in the Malice Domestic contest and came in third. Her amateur sleuth, Martha Rose, is incensed at injustice, and Mary's own interest in social activism winds its way into the story.

Her writing style is more "seat of pants" as opposed to outlining. At the beginning of each book, she does know who's getting killed, though she may not know who the villain is. She workshops her pages at a writers' critique group and uses Autocrit to search for overused words, cliches, etc. Her future books will include a quilter's tip at the end of each book.


